

Research Explores Radiation-Induced Changes in Tooth Structure



ost dental practitioners are familiar with the challenges of providing care to patients who have received radiotherapy to treat head and neck cancer. While the radiotherapy saves the lives of many of these patients, they face a lifetime of post-radiation complications that can include severe tooth breakdown, which can be very difficult to manage.

Unlike typical dental caries, post-radiation dental lesions start with shear fracture of enamel at sites exposed to occlusal loading and flexure (cervical, cuspal, incisal). Post-radiation caries has been linked to radiation-induced salivary gland damage and associated xerostomia, but evidence from a previous NIH-funded clinical study at UMKC (Dr. Mary Walker-PI) suggests a direct effect of radiation on the

dentition. Based on that information, the UMKC research team (Drs. Mary Walker, Yong Wang and Jeff Gorski) received funding for another NIH grant to understand possible radiation-induced changes in tooth structure.



The research project includes a systematic evaluation of tooth structure via innovative instrumentation and technology such as Raman microspectroscopy, atomic force microscopy/nanoindentation, confocal microscopy, and electron microscopy. Because the initial lesions start with

shear fracture of enamel from dentin, the research team is focused on evaluating the dentin-enamel junction (DEJ) and adjacent enamel and dentin prior to and after radiotherapy to potentially explain altered structure/function characteristics of radiated teeth.

In addition to evaluating teeth after therapeutic radiation, the study requires baseline information from non-radiated teeth, so the team has learned updated information about enamel and its interface with dentin. Based on our results, enamel is more complicated than what you likely learned in dental school. For example, enamel is not a homogenous material in content or properties. Instead, we reported a property gradient across enamel with outer enamel being harder and stiffer than inner enamel, and the gradient appears to be associated with differences in the crystalline structure. As part our investigation, we also detected a layer of enamel-associated proteins adjacent to the DEI; this was a very surprising finding since enamel has been considered essentially devoid of protein. Even more significant, these proteins may be a key component in bonding enamel to dentin. So while this information is critical for our study in terms of focusing on targets that might be susceptible to radiotherapy, a better understanding of enamel and its interface with dentin is also valuable for developing restorative materials. One possible application might be developing porcelain with graded properties similar to enamel to address chipping problems currently seen with zirconia-based all-ceramic restorations. The outcomes from studies such as ours reinforce the importance and benefits of research teams that integrate basic scientists and clinician scientists to address clinically relevant questions.

Dr. Jacqueline Demko Reaches Out with

Inspiration and Transportation



Aguiding principle for Jacqueline Demko (DDS '98) is: "true beauty radiates from within, and the most beautiful smiles begin from the inside." She lives that philosophy inside and outside her three orthodontic practices in greater St. Louis, Mo. She began to extend her

reach in 2007 when she purchased a customized 8-passenger HUMMER to ferry students from 24 schools in Washington County to her practice and back. Since then she has dedicated one day a week to treating "HUMMER kids,"

whose families would otherwise be unable to access orthodontic treatment. She treats about 75 Washington County school kids a year.

"I've always been passionate," says Dr. Demko, "about ensuring that each family that chooses Demko Orthodontics leaves feeling that their overall life has been positively impacted by their time in treatment here." So during her early years in

practice, she applied that passion to establishing a rapport with her patients and their families that made them feel comfortable sharing stories about the challenges and difficulties in their lives. In response, Dr. Demko would describe how her father (also an orthodontist) had helped her overcome her own obstacles and hardships by telling her inspirational true stories that instilled strength and confidence in her. Patients and parents appreciated Dr. Demko's mentorship, so she decided to expand her efforts

to impact others the way she had been inspired by her father and patients.

Not long after Dr. Demko had the HUMMER program up and running, she launched another initiative to impact the lives of young people. Through CODE:SMiLE, a nonprofit organization she helped establish in 2008, Dr. Demko facilitates healthy dialogue and character building skills in young adults.

"CODE:SMiLE's goal," says Demko, "is to collaborate with inspirational mentors, parents and young adults to bring awareness that uniqueness and personal struggles, if harnessed properly, can to personal achievement and

fulfillment."

In 2008 she organized and hosted the first CODE:SMiLE event and invited the families in her practice and the public to listen to inspirational stories told by three local celebrities: McGraw Milhaven (a local radio host), Heather Hawk (a nationally known health and fitness expert) and David Vabora (an NFL player). The event was a success, and Dr. Demko has built on that success.

She anticipates that about 1,000 5th through 7th grade students and their parents and teachers will attend the next CODE:SMiLE event on Thursday, Oct. 10, 2013.

Dental Hygiene Announces New Scholarships



The annual UMKC Dental Hygienists' Alumni Association (DHAA) luncheon and business meeting during the Midwest Dental Conference is always a joyous affair filled with fanfare, friendship and special announcements. The highlights of the 2013 MDC DHAA luncheon, Friday, April 12, included the official introduction of two new endowed scholarship funds.

The "Centennial Scholarship" honors the dental hygiene profession's 100th anniversary celebration in 2013. To fund this scholarship the UMKC DHAA board contributed \$1,200 to kick off a fundraising campaign to raise a total of \$20,000 that would be matched by a scholarship initiative sponsored by the UMKC Foundation.

The other endowed scholarship honors Sherry Burns, RDH, MS, who has enjoyed a distinguished professional career spanning four decades with extensive experience as a clinician, educator, researcher, author, and community dental hygienist. Sherry completed an MS degree in dental hygiene at UMKC in 1972 and served as an associate professor in the UMKC Division of Dental Hygiene from 1972 to 1979 and from 1983 to 1987, and in the Department of Periodontics from 1987 to 1990.

Even though Sherry departed from the UMKC School of Dentistry in 1990 to join the Hu-Friedy Mfg. Co., where she now serves as the senior global education consultant, she never lost touch with UMKC. She and her colleague, Jan Haun, (DH '81), pioneered the development and presentation of small group "handson" continuing education courses for members of the "dental team," primarily at the UMKC School of Dentistry Department of CDE. Sherry is well-known for her engaging and entertaining approach to sharing her extensive knowledge of instrument design, sharpening and clinical techniques. She is the originator of the design concept for the After Five® curettes and the simplified sharpening strategy known as "It's About Time to Get on the Cutting Edge." Her most recent creative efforts contributed to the innovative concept of the Satin SwivelTM Ultrasonic Insert and the Gracey 17/18 curette.

Sherry's long-time friend and colleague, Maxine Tishk, served as a guiding force in the fundraising effort to establish the scholarship. At the present time, more than \$31,000 has been donated to the endowment.
