In the thick of fighting COVID

Pandemics have a way of upending expectations.

Fortunately alumni, faculty and students of the UMKC School of Dentistry have a way of forging ahead regardless of obstacles and challenges, fulfilling the school's mission to serve society and care for patients.

That's how Michael McCuniff (DDS '83) in early 2020 ended up helping quarantine a planeload of passengers returning from Wuhan, China.

That's how Meghan Wendland, a new member of the faculty when the coronavirus hit, ended up arranging treatment for students with COVID-19, and then a year later training dozens of dental students to give pandemic-busting vaccines.

It's also how Tiara Fry, DDS Class of 2022, found herself learning to administer vaccines and then, along with McCuniff and Wendland and others from the school, inoculating members of the Kansas City and UMKC community.

So much for retirement

In February 2020, McCuniff thought he was easing toward retirement after taking emeritus status the previous spring. The longtime chair of the Department of Dental Public Health and Behavioral Science was working two days a week at the school, helping his successor and others in that department take over his previous duties.

When he joined the faculty in 1991, McCuniff brought several years in private practice and certification in public health dentistry to the school. For three decades he helped make public health a priority for the School of Dentistry, shaping and teaching the curriculum, arranging student rotations to urban and rural health clinics, and helping students find scholarships and placement in public health jobs.

McCuniff also pursued his interest in forensic dentistry and emergency response work as a member of the National Disaster Medical System and Missouri's State Emergency Management Team.

During the H1N1 pandemic, he was trained to run a quarantine operation, whether at an international border, a port or an airport. In February 2020, before

COVID-19 was declared a pandemic, he was called on to use those skills at Travis Air Force Base northeast of San Francisco.

"We were told we were going to be taking care of some Americans who were back from celebrating Chinese New Year in a little town in China called Wuhan," McCuniff said.

He was part of a team that tended to about 200 people who had been flown back to the United States on a chartered 747. Some had to be hospitalized, he said, and a few of them died. The majority fared better, though, housed in isolation in a hotel-like structure on the air base and monitored carefully by McCuniff and others.

If the people returning from Wuhan had been happy and relieved to be released after their quarantine, the group from the cruise ship was positively overjoyed when its two weeks was over.

"The morning that they left, we were there at 4:30 in the morning, and I tell you they were ready to go," McCuniff said. "They truly appreciated everything we had tried to do for them. If anything about a pandemic can be fun, that was fun."

At his last federal quarantine assignment, at an air base outside Atlanta, he got a deeper appreciation of COVID-19's potential perils. A physician at the base said he had come from a posting in South Africa, where he had been working on

Rather than heading home when that first quarantined group did, McCuniff stayed at the base until early March for another assignment: Americans who had endured a long, fearful quarantine in Japan on the Diamond Princess cruise ship were coming back to the United States.

"These folks had already been through a lot," McCuniff said. "We set up different screening stations in a hangar, and I worked with a small team that included a physician from the Centers for Disease Control. We screened passengers who already appeared ill, almost certainly had COVID and were headed for hospitalization."

Every patient was carefully swabbed for possible evidence of the coronavirus. "Those swabs were like gold, in short supply at that time," McCuniff recalled, so they were quickly put into coolers and shipped to Atlanta for analysis at the CDC.

keeping the Ebola virus contained.

McCuniff said, "I knew then if we were pulling people off Ebola to work on COVID, well ..."

Back at the dental school, McCuniff was a key member of the COVID task force and led the committee charged with reopening the school safely for patients, faculty, staff and students. He spent hours reviewing CDC safety recommendations and incorporating them into the school's plans.

With his state emergency response team, McCuniff helped St. Louis establish a mobile morgue when the area's regular facilities were full. He also was part of COVID testings around the state and then mass vaccination events.

McCuniff said he "retired again" in June, going from part-time to adjunct status at the school. And when he has time apart from his work with the state task force and teaching public health courses

online for an Arizona university, he volunteers to give vaccinations in midtown Kansas City at the KC Care Health Center.

Lessons come to life

You also could find Meghan Wendland volunteering to give vaccines at that KC Care center earlier this year. Since joining the school in November 2019 as an assistant professor, Wendland has been building ties to such community institutions and looking for opportunities to give dental students more public health experience.

Wendland brought impressive credentials to UMKC, including a DDS from the University of Southern California and a master's in public health from Dartmouth, along with a residency at a federally qualified health clinic on the south side of Chicago. Just as important, she brought her passion for public health and health equity.

Wendland took over a heavy teaching load from McCunniff, from courses in ethics and professionalism, to dental behavioral science and public health. Besides surgical skills, she aims to give students the perspective and knowledge they will need to improve patients' overall health.

"I also help the students rotate through Score 1 for Health, a partnership with Kansas City University that provides health screenings in elementary schools," she said. When the pandemic curtailed in-person screenings, Wendland and her students adapted.

"Our elementary school partners really need those dental screenings to identify kids who have issues that need to be addressed," Wendland said. "We were able to run a really successful program using some intraoral cameras and training the school nurses to operate them."

Her dental students got valuable telehealth experience, teaming up remotely with the school nurses to conduct the elementary students' examinations. And they were able to see the importance of reaching into underserved communities, no matter the obstacles.

Wendland also faced challenges beyond adapting routines and course work to the pandemic's more online world.

"As a faculty member with a master's in public health, I was tasked with doing all the case management for any of our students who got COVID," Wendland said. "That was a heavy workload, but the pandemic changed everyone's workload and job description tremendously."

Wendland also made sure dental students could participate, along with students from the other health sciences schools, when the need arose for help with drive-up COVID-19 testings — and when federal legislation cleared the way for students in health sciences to administer COVID-19 vaccines.

With help from faculty at the School of Nursing and Health Studies, Wendland trained all of her third-year students and some fourth-years early in April, adding nearly 120 dental students to the pool of UMKC student vaccinators.

The students quickly were able to join in at Truman Medical Center and other vaccine sites, including on campus.

"We always talk about the importance of interprofessional education, of getting out of our silos, and the pandemic gave us real experience working with students from pharmacy, medicine and nursing," Wendland said.

Adding an unexpected skill

Tiara Fry, as a third-year dental student seeing patients, was vaccinated well before she was among the students in Wendland's vaccination training.

"I felt for those who were extremely afraid of needles," she said. "Many would tell me right before I gave the injection, so I tried my best to make them feel as comfortable as possible."

Fry, who chose dentistry "because I knew I wanted to help people," said she was glad to add giving vaccines to her skills for helping others.

"I was a little nervous the first few shots I gave," said Fry, a St. Louis native who got her undergraduate degree in molecular and cell biology at Rockhurst University in Kansas City. "But once I got comfortable with it, it was great! It felt amazing to be a part of diminishing the spread of a virus during a pandemic."

Fry has her sights set on a career as an orthodontist. "I've always admired the art and beauty of fixing someone's smile," she said, "and the problem-solving, math and physics" that orthodontic correction requires.

If she stays in general dentistry, however, Fry says she will consider working in public health, especially after her experience giving COVID-19 vaccines.

"I definitely felt warm inside knowing that I was contributing to a great cause," Fry said. "Dr. McCunniff and Dr. Wendland are two people who genuinely care about improving the scope of public health."

People might not have expected to find dentists, professors and dental

Being vaccinated was a massive relief for her, she said, and she hoped to share that relief with those she was able to vaccinate.

PRACTITIONERS CAN BE INNOVATORS TOO

The spirit of discovery is pushing the school's graduates to improve dental care and make a difference

Throughout its history, the UMKC School of Dentistry has not only prepared the next generation of oral health care professionals, it has encouraged an innovative spirit among its graduates. Today, many still display this spirit of discovery, improving dental care and making a difference as both practitioners and innovators.

When the solution is your passion

While ergonomic instruments are more commonplace around today's modern dental chair, Melanie Simmer-Beck (DH '93, MS '04, Ph.D. '13)

remembers times when dental instruments were quite hard on the hands. And she had an invention she hoped would change that.

Working as a dental hygienist at a periodontal office in Overland Park, Kansas, much of her work consisted of treating acute dental issues, and the strain on her hands was taking a toll.

"Most of the tools back then were heavy, and I started to learn that there are a lot of musculoskeletal issues in the dental field," Simmer-Beck said. "It was my physical therapist that said, 'You know, isn't there some way to make the handles bigger?'"

It turned out she wasn't the only hygienist at the practice having issues, and soon, she and a co-worker got to work on a DIY solution. They tried out materials from a local plumbing supply store — some thick rubber tubing to cushion the grip handles of dental instruments — and that certainly helped. But it came with drawbacks.

"Our boss felt it was pretty unsightly," Simmer-Beck said, "and, to be honest, the thick rubber material kind of stunk up the place."

It wasn't long before Simmer-Beck's spirit of innovation took over and they got serious about filling this missing

piece in the marketplace. They reached out to a patent attorney and lined up a vendor to manufacture the grips. They also found an out-of-state car parts manufacturer that could produce the molds needed to make the grips. The finished product was a soft foam tube of varying sizes and colors that could be slipped onto the grip of a dental instrument.


According to Simmer-Beck, working with the manufacturer was an unexpected roller coaster ride. Although the car parts company was able to produce enough grips for getting initial orders out to dental professionals, the company went bankrupt and she found the mold for her grips had disappeared with the company.

Already a year into the process — and with a buyer lined up for the rights to market the grips — Simmer-Beck was still committed to her invention. “So, I was coming home every day after work and packaging up the grips to mail out to people,” she said. “After I sold the rights to the grips, the buyer was able to work out getting another mold. He is still selling them to this day!”

Ultimately, all the perseverance needed to see her invention through had a silver lining — it brought her back to UMKC. She brought some of the grips back to the school to show them off to the faculty. It was Cynthia Amyot (DH '92, MS '93, PhD '03), then the director of the Division of Dental Hygiene, who asked what kind of research she had done on the grips. “I had done some,” Simmer-Beck said, “but now looking back, I’m almost embarrassed at what I thought was research back then.”

Amyot asked if Simmer-Beck had ever considered a master’s degree because her research would make for a great thesis. That encouragement was all it took. “I went home to my husband and told him, ‘Hey, I think I’m going to get my master’s degree.’”

Simmer-Beck has been a full-time faculty member and researcher at UMKC ever since, teaching continuously since 2004. She’s even gone back for her Ph.D.

“I chose UMKC because I knew it would be rigorous and would emphasize critical thinking and perseverance,” said Simmer-Beck. “The school isn’t just training hygienists for the dental office alone, it’s training them to be leaders in the field nationwide.”

An idea worth revisiting

For Keith Robinson (DDS '74) a good idea is always worth revisiting, even if it’s a couple decades later. He’s now serving patients as a maxillofacial prosthodontist in Texas, but back in 1985, Robinson was completing his fellowship at the MD Anderson Cancer Center where he was treating incredibly sick patients all day, every day. Working in that type of environment got him thinking about better ways to keep germs from spreading and

infections at a minimum.

Though precautions were taken, Robinson believed more could be done for better protection. “Whatever my patients put in the air,” he said, “I was wearing it on me somewhere, but mostly on my face.”

The medical-grade masks that health care providers wear offered a good start, but Robinson wanted something patients could wear during exams. What began to percolate in his head was a prototype for what would become single-use, suction-based personal protective equipment (PPE) using tubing. He did some research, drew up what he envisioned and even started working to create preliminary models.

Eventually, life got in the way and Robinson shelved the idea. “When you’re young, you think you’re

bulletproof, and it's not until you get older you realize that's not the case," he said.

When the global COVID pandemic hit, Robinson found the motivation needed to finally see his invention through to fruition. For the past year, he's been working with a manufacturer to perfect his innovative approach to PPE: a suction-based, hybrid mask made of tubing that fits below the nose, encircling the mouth of the patient. The device works to remove respiratory pathogens transmitted through the air. They are now testing a fully functional model called the CloudEvac.

Robinson credits his father for his tinkering mindset. When he was little, his dad worked on early computer systems and would bring home all kinds of equipment. He would put these mechanical pieces on the table and start explaining to Robinson what each did.

"I didn't even know it was happening," said Robinson, "but now I know he was implanting in me an inventive mind."

Ask and ye shall receive

Baron Grutter (DDS '10) takes the label "power user" to a different level. For nearly a decade, in addition to seeing patients, he's been work-

When it comes to digital technology, Grutter says he "never had any reservations about asking questions and getting help from others. I also found that I really enjoyed sharing those answers with others and helping them with troubleshooting."

Grutter's interest in computer programming goes back to his undergraduate years when he took a computer programming class, "not because I needed to, but just for fun." His father was an electrical engineer, so he's always had an appreciation for the engineering side of things.

That interest helped him make his choice of dental schools, as well. He is originally from Michigan and did his undergrad at a small university in Iowa, so he had a number of states he could consider for dental school. But it was UMKC's early adoption of chair-side, comprehensive electronic patient records that made his decision easy.

"It was that digital mindset and a personal characteristic that linked me to UMKC," said Grutter. "When I knew the dental school had gone digital before anyone else, I thought, 'Well this is me.'"

In the last few years, he's taken on a more formal role with the aligner software company Blue Sky, serving as a project manager and working almost daily to test new program revi-

of long emails, they said, "You know, why don't you just join our team?"

His new responsibilities have allowed him to cut back on the days he's seeing patients. On his off days, he's frequently still in the office, but spends time running dental cases through software and jotting down notes for one of his aforementioned lengthy emails.

"This wasn't something I envisioned myself getting involved with," said Grutter. "But bridging the gap between clinical treatments and digital planning fits well with how my brain works."

When Robinson's not working on software, he is working on his lecture materials for the classes he offers to fellow dentists to help with technology adoption, among other things. He jokes, "I'm pretty much active every other hour that I'm not sleeping."

Helping others is a key component to his interest in technology — whether it's for his patients or other dentists — and he's quick to offer encouragement to those in the profession.





He also served as the team dentist for the professional basketball team the Kansas City Kings.

He was a part-time faculty member at the School of Dentistry for many years and joined full time in 1995, continuing with the school through 2011. He took many students and colleagues on annual dental mission trips to Venezuela, Honduras and Mexico. 




